The club was sanctioned in 2020 but was finally endorsed by Pune District Legal Service Authority (DLSA) this year. It was inaugurated by Mr Sanjay Deshmukh, the Principal District Judge, Pune and Chairman, DSLA.

Like all other clubs in various Symbiosis colleges, this club also fosters learning opportunities for its students. However, what makes this club different is that it has provided its members with the added exposure to practice as paralegals while also benefiting the community. Adv. Sangramjit Chauhan of SLS, one of the faculty in charge of the club, said, "The club's objective is to undertake pro bono public activities and promote social justice and raise the confidence of the underprivileged."

Law students in the club said that this club would be an excellent opportunity to reach out to those who cannot afford legal fees or do not have much knowledge about their rights or legal literacy. The Pro Bono Club will be working with the Community Legal Care & Literacy Cell (CLCL). The students also said they have previously organized aid camps at the Daulat Rao Jadhav Prison Officer's Training College and the Regional Mental Health Hospital, Yerwada, with the CLCL.

Wordle fever grips Symbiosis

"It's more than just a game," SCMC thirdyear Yashvi Shah says about the muchadmired game Wordle, "it's a lifestyle."

The game, created by software engineer Josh Wardle in 2021 took the world by storm in the following months. The rules are uncomplicated; a player must guess a five-letter word within six tries. Each guess reveals whether any of the letters are either a part of the word and if they are, then whether they are in the correct place. There's only one word you can guess in a day, and the word changes at midnight.

It's unsurprising then, that when something gains popularity on the internet, it becomes all the rage at SCMC. For a game that takes hardly a few minutes to complete, the words "today's Wordle" resounds through the SCMC halls more than a few times. Students can be seen sharing their Wordle scores - which is es-

When the once-bustling streets of Viman Nagar became barren, Nitasha and Vikas Shivaramani started to look out for the street animals. When the pandemic struck, the street dogs who depended on humans for food suffered too. Worried about how they would survive without help, the couple decided to feed them on a daily basis.

What started in the March of 2020 with a handful of dogs in their society, has now grown to over 140 stomachs they are filling today on a daily basis. "During the pandemic, we started to see more of dogs and less of humans. Every day we thought just a little further, this street also. Before we knew

it we started to provide food for most dogs in our area.", said Nitasha Shivaramani. They cover a vast area from the airport road, the entirety of Sakore Nagar all the way to the street beyond the Phoenix mall.

With the help of other animal lovers and those wishing to help through volunteering and donations, they give out food including 600-700 kgs of rice and 100-110 kg of chicken every month. The chicken and rice are cooked in chicken broth with turmeric, which is the only animal-safe spice. These ingredients are often donated by well-wishers, volunteers, and even owners of shops who are animal lovers. Often a dog walker or feeder is hired to cook the food and distribute it among these street dogs once every day.
